Department: Biblical Counseling

BIBLICAL COUNSELING I & II

C-647, 648 This course offers an alternative to all problem-focused counseling approaches, and is intended to provide the counselor with the How-To for staying on track doing the counseling interview. 8 credits

COUNSELING INTERNSHIP

C-653 This course provides an opportunity for the student to put into practice what he has learned by associating himself with another trained counselor, or by establishing a Christian Counseling practice. This would be considered a work project whereby the student would submit to the seminary a detailed summary of...

BIBLICAL COUNSELING I & II

C-655, 656 This course provides an introduction into the counseling process and presents the student with numerous issues, which may be encountered by a counselor. 8 credit hours

PSYCHOLOGICAL PROBLEMS

C-553 This course allows the Christian Counselor to study various psychological problems. Their description, and how other counselors have dealt with these problems. 8 credit hours

BASIC PRINCIPLE OF COUNSELING

C-554 This course presents the basic principles of counseling through a balanced view of people, problems, and solutions. 8 credit hours

PSYCHOLOGY AND COUNSELING

C-550, 551 (650, 651 4 credit hours) This course takes a "HOLISTIC" approach to the study of human behavior. The student studies human nature and human motivation, becoming a whole person, basic cause of psychological problems, helping people become whole, and helping families grow. This course is required of all...

PREMARITAL COUNSELING

C-544, 545, (644, 645 4 credit hours) This course presents the counselor with those things he should know about counseling with premarital. 8 credit hours

PASTORAL COUNSELING

C-541, 445, 446 This course is designed for pastors and ministers who desire to acquire the skills of counseling within their pastorate. 4 credit hours

CHRISTIAN COUNSELING

C-421 An introduction into Christian Counseling process and present the student with numerous issues, which may be encountered by the counselor. 4 credit hours

Crisis Counseling I-II

C-520-620 Crisis Counseling I-II This course allows the student to look into the study of the skills of pastoral care and counseling with various methods of crisis interpretation, from the field of psychology and psychotherapy. 4 credit hours

CRISIS COUNSELING I, II, III & IV

C-520/620 521/621 522/622 523/623 This course allows the students to look into the study of the skills of pastoral care and counseling with various methods of crisis interpretation, from the fields of psychology and psychotherapy. 4 credit hours

Department: Biblical Studies

The Pentateuch I-II

B-431-432 An introduction into the first five books of the Bible. Students will become familiar with the Pentateuch and it's an influence on Israel and the world. 4 credit hours

WISDOM LITERATURE

B-430-4 This course covers the wisdom books of Job, Proverbs and Ecclesiastes. 4 credit hours

EARLY JEWISH HISTORY

B-420-4 A history of the Jews from Abraham to the destruction of the temple in 70 A.D. 4 credit hours

BIBLICAL CRITICISM

B-410-4 An analysis of how the Bible has been translated textually and syntactically, and what translation is accurate. 4 credit hours

MATTHEW

B-590-4 An examination of the first of the Gospels; the Jewish Gospel, speaks of the King and the kingdom. 4 credit hours

APOCALYPTIC LITERATURE

B-580-4 An in-depth look at the book of Revelation and the passages of the Old Testament that deal with the issue. 4 credit hours

HEBREWS

B-560-4 A look into the Biblical book to the Hebrews. 4 credit hours

GOSPEL OF JOHN

B-340-4 An overview of the fourth Gospel is the subject of this course. 4 credit hours

DANIEL/EZEKIEL

B-330-4 Upon completion of this study, each student will understand how some of these prophecies have been fulfilled, where others have not and why. 4 credit hours

LIFE OF DAVID

B-310-4 David, King of Israel, anointed of God, is the total subject of this course. His life from birth to the time of his death is intensely investigated. 4 credit hours

ISAIAH

B-300-4 Students will study this great servant of God and the influence he had on the Hebrew nation. 4 credit hours

ESTHER

B-240-4 The student will examine God's faithfulness and provision. A tribute to the God of an exiled people without a Temple of Priesthood; without a Prophet or great Spiritual Leader. 4 credit hours

LIFE OF CHRIST

B-230-4 This course deals with the life of Christ from birth through his appearance after his resurrection. 4 credit hours

CORINTHIANS AND THE CHURCH TODAY

B-550-4 How Paul's first letter to the church of Corinth influenced them and also its impact on the Church today.

LETTER TO THE ROMANS

B-540-4 An analysis of Paul's letter to the Romans. 4 credit hours

ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

B-530-4 An in-depth look at the Apostles from their walk with Christ through the formation of the early church.

JOB

B-520-4 This course covers an in-depth study of the book of Job. 4 credit hours

BIBLE I & II

B-425 An introduction into Basic Bible Study. 4 credit hours

BIBLIOLOGY

B-546 An intense study of each book of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. 4 credit hours

ACTS AND PAULINE EPISTLES

B-415 The student is given a survey of the Book of Acts in relation to Paul's conversion and the epistles, which he wrote. Emphasis is placed on the theme and background of each book. 4 credit hours

THE GOSPELS

B-427 The student is given an overview of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John in relation to the author, message, and the life of Christ. 4 credit hours

NEW TESTAMENT SURVEY

B-426 An introduction to the New Testament from Matthew to Revelation. 4 credit hours

PARABLES OF JESUS

B-370-4 A study of the parables as related in the Gospels.

LETTERS OF PETER

B-360-4 An overview of the letters of Peter.

PASTORAL EPISTLES

B-530-4 An overview of Paul's letters to Timothy, Titus and Philemon, and how they relate to the Church today. 4 Credit Hours

LIFE OF DAVID

B-403 David, King of Israel, anointed of God, is the total subject of this course. His life from birth to the time of his death is intensely investigated.

SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

B-840-4 This course is designed to provide the student with the opportunity to do a commentary analysis of a book of scripture.

EXEGESIS IN HERMENEUTICS

B-830-4 An in-depth study of the words in scripture within the hermeneutical process.

HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY OF THE HOLY LAND

B-820-4 A study of the history and geography of the region presented in scripture.

QUMRAN LITERATURE

B-810-4 An in-depth study of the Dead Sea Scrolls.

APOCRYPHAL AND PSEUDEPIGRAPHICAL LITERATURE

B-800-4 This course is the study of documents written during the inter-testamental period and the literature that is falsely attributed to Biblical writers.

PROVERBS III

B-630-4 Continuation covering chapters 21-31.

PROVERBS II

B-620 Continuation covering chapters 11-20.

PROVERBS I

B-610-4 A verse-by-verse study of the first ten chapters of this book of wisdom.

MINOR PROPHETS

B-511, 611 An overview of these significant works. Each student will be able to relate the history of Israel to Scripture. 4 credit hours

MAJOR PROPHETS I & II

B-513, 613 A study of the books of Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel and Daniel. Special emphasis will be placed on the relation these books have with Christ as the central point, and how prophecy has been fulfilled in history . 4 credit hours

THE LIFE OF CHRIST

B-428, 429 An in depth study is made of the life of Christ, His words and works from the point of view that He is the pre-existent Son of God. The events are traced from His lowly birth to His glorious ascension. 4 credit hours

GREAT MEN OF THE BIBLE I & II

B-596/696 597/697 403, 404 An in depth study of various men of the bible from Genesis to Revelation. Examining their culture, religion, as well as their contribution to the body of Christ and how they were used of God. 4 credit hours

THE TABERNACLE I, II, III & IV

B-580/680 581/681 582/682 583/683 An in depth study of the purpose and construction of the tabernacle of Moses and its affect on the people of his time and what the significance of the tabernacle today in reference to New Testament studies. 4 credit hours

PRAYER I, II & III

B-491, 492, 493, 494 The students will learn about different types of prayers as well as explore and practice different ways to pray; thus nurturing spiritual growth through

HOMELETIC I, II, III & IV

B-424, 425, 426, 427 A study of sermon preparation relating to plan arrangement, introduction, body, conclusion, and various types of sermons: textual, topical, expository, and doctrinal. 4 credit hours

THE JEWISH EXPERIENCE

B-581 A look into the life and ways of the Jewish people and the ancient Hebrew nation to explore their culture and customs. 4 credit hours

THE HOLY SPIRIT

B-480, 631 This course deals with who the Holy Spirit is. His operation and office, gifts and fruits as well as the trinity. 4 credit hours

Knowing and Doing God's Will B-401, 402, 501, 601 12 weeks A study of the understanding of God's will for your life as you seek to experience Him. 4 credit hours

The Pentateuch I-II

B-431-432 An introduction into the first five books of the Bible. Students will become familiar with the Pentateuch and it's an influence on Israel and the world. 4 credit hours

Department: Christian Counseling

GERIATRIC COUNSELING

CC-560-4 This course is a look into counseling the older adult. 4 credit hours

FAMILY COUNSELING

CC-550-4 An in-depth study of family counseling. 4 credit hours

ADOLESCENT COUNSELING

CC-540-4 This is an in-depth study into different aspects of counseling, the adolescent and his or her family. 4 credit hours

STRESS PREVENTION

CC-590-2 This course provides the student with an understanding that stress is not unavoidable and how to manage it. 4 credit hours

NOUTHETIC COUNSELING

CC-580-4 An examination into the counseling technique of direct biblical confrontation. 4 credit hours

BIBLICAL PSYCHOLOGY

CC-500-4 This course provides the student with various integrative views of Theology and Psychology by different people in the field. The student will also be required to present his or her own view of how the Bible, their Theology and Psychology can be brought together. 4 credit hours.

Department: Christian Doctrine

CHRISTIAN DOCTRINE

D-403 A study of the doctrine of God. 4 credit hours

KENOSIS

D-475 A study of the doctrine of Jesus Christ. 4 credit hours

Department: Christian Education

NOUTHETIC COUNSELING

CC-580-4 An examination into the counseling technique of direct biblical confrontation. 4 credit hours

PHILOSOPHY OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION I

CE-801-4 The scope of this course encompasses Biblical and American historical concepts of Christian Education.

CHRISTIAN LEADERSHIP

CE-600-4 This course prepares the Christian teacher in the development if leadership abilities in the field of education as well as in the classroom.

BIBLICAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION I

CE-501-4 This course is taught using the Bible as the basis for educational principles and ideas showing the relevancy of the Word of God in today's educational process.

Department: Church History

CHURCH HISTORY I & II

H-524, 525, 424, 425 An in-depth look at the history of the church. 4 credit hours

UNDERSTANDING THE BIBLE

H-426 This course introduces the student to the Bible as to its origin, its language, its canon, its inspiration, and etc. 4 credit hours

A SURVEY OF ISRAEL'S HISTORY I & II

H-641, 642 This course seeks to tell of the history of the Israelite people concerning their ancestral background, period of development in Egypt, as well as her beginning as separate tribes in the promise land. 4 credit hours

THE BIBLE AND JUDAISM

H-439 A study of Jewish holidays, religious practices, and doctrines. A section is devoted to the Messianic prophecies. 4 credit hours

Department: Church Ministry

APOLOGETICS III

M-600-4 Advanced systematic defense of the Christian faith. 4 credit hours

INDEPENDENT RESEARCH PROJECT

M-690 This course is designed to allow the student working on the graduate or post-graduate conduct an independent research project in a given area of the ministry, which would aid the student in an area most beneficial to him. 32 credit hours

THE KENOSIS

M-580-4 The doctrine of Jesus Christ (Christology) is taught in this course. The following aspects will be discussed. \cdot The person of Jesus Christ \cdot The Deity and self emptying \cdot The work of Christ

CULT AWARENESS I, II

M-503, 504 A survey of what the cults believe and a brief survey of their history. 4 credit hours

INDEPENDENT RESEARCH PROJECT

M-590 This course is designed to allow the student working on the graduate or post-graduate conduct an independent research project in a given area of the ministry, which would aid the student in an area most beneficial to him. 20 credit hours.

PERSONAL EVANGELISM

M-422 What part the church plays in bringing people to know Christ. 4 credit hours

MISSIONS

M-437 This course acquaints the student with basic missionary principles, purposes, and activities. It is expected to lead the student into the position of intelligent cooperation with the missionary program of the church and install a vital missionary vision. 4 credit hours

THE HOLY SPIRIT IN THE CHURCH TODAY

M-800-4 This is an in-depth study of how the Holy Spirit works within the body of Christ today. 4 credit hours

BIBLE TYPES

M-529 A study of Old Testament types, which point to the Lord Jesus Christ as coming Savior. This explains how the New Testament is concealed in the Old Testament. 4 credit hours

INTRODUCTION TO CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

M-433 This course introduces the student to various aspects of Christian education. Any student desiring to teach or administrator Christian education should complete this course. 4 Credit Hours

ETHICS

M-530-4 The rights, responsibilities and problems of both students and teachers will be investigated and the student will generate possible insights.

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION

M-520-4 The Christian organization is examined from the standpoint of management are discussed. Principles of leadership and management are discussed. Planning, bookkeeping, accounting and control as characteristics needed for good leadership are also discussed.

CHRISTIANITY 101 I & II

M-407, 408 This course focuses on the development of Christian Doctrine with special attention to Trinitarian and Christological Issues. 4 credit hours

EVANGELISM I & II

M-423, 424 A study of how to invite unbelievers into the presence of God and at the same time introduces them to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. 4 credit hours

DISCIPLINE OF DISCIPLESHIP

M-472 This course deals with discipline divine the dispensation of innocence, conscience, and self-government with a look at the nation under law, judgment, and monarchy. 4 credit hours

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION I & II

M-421, 422 The Christian organization is examined from the standpoint of management principles of leadership and management. 4 credit hours

WOMEN IN MINISTRY I, II & III

M-428, 429, 430 This course examines the ministries of women leaders in the history of the church seeking to justify women privileges and liberty to participate in public Christian ministry. 4 credit hours

Missionology I-II

M-537-637 This course acquaints the student with basic missionary principles, purpose, and activities. It is expected to lead the student into the position of intelligent cooperation with the missionary program of the church and install a vital missionary vision. 4 credit hours

Evangelist I-II

M-422-423 A study of how to invite unbelievers into the presence of God and at the same time introduce them to our Lord and Savoiur Jesus Christ. 4 credit hours

Homiletic I-II

M-424-425 The study of sermon preparation relating to plan arrangement, introduction, body, conclusion, and various types of sermon; textual, topical, expository, and doctrinal. 4 credit hours

Department: Language

GREEK WORD STUDY

L-501 This course does not prepare the student in the Greek language, but rather is a Greek word study leading the student to appreciate the Greek language. 4 credit hours

Department: Religion

PHILOSOPHY SINCE THE 700'S

R-250-2 A study of the impact of philosophy upon religious faith. 4 credit hours

JEWISH EXPERIENCE

R-210-2 This course looks at the basic historical religious beginnings of the Hebrew nation and follows the national development up through the centuries until the nation was destroyed in 70 A.D. 4 credit hours

WORLD RELIGIONS I & II

R-513, 514, 614 This is a comprehensive study of world religions from ancient Egypt, Greece, and Rome to present day primal religions and the great religions Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Islam and Christianity. 4 credit hours

APOLOGETICS

R-460 This course is a study of the defense of the Holy Scriptures with the approach to help the student to defend the Faith, which was once delivered unto the saints against the attacks and ridicule of those who oppose Christianity. 4 credit hours

LATER CHRISTIAN EXPERIENCE

R-475 A continuation of the development of the church. 4 credit hours

CHRISTIAN ETHICS I & II

R-400/401 600, 601 The rights, responsibilities and problems of morals as it relates to life and the church. 4 credit hours

I Christian Ethic I-I

R-500-600 The rights, responsibilities and problems of morals as it relates to life and the church. 4 credit hours

PHILOSOPHY

R-491 This course offers an introduction into the philosophical issues that face defenders of the Christian Faith. 4 credit hours

Department: Theology

ESCHATOLOGY I & II

T-500/501 Biblical Eschatology is a study of things to come. It consists of a study of methods of interpretation of the various biblical covenants, the course of this present age, the different tribulation theories, the second advent of Christ, the judgments, as well as the millennial reign of Christ, and...

GENERAL THEOLOGY II

T-551/651 This course is a continuation of General Theology I and presents a study of anthropology, hamartiology, Ecclesiology, angeology, and Eschatogy. 4 credit hours

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY

T-650 This course is far more in-depth than Advanced Christian Theology and requires research and writing in the area of Prolegomena, Bibliology, theology proper, Angeology, Anthropology, Hamartiology, Soteriology and etc. 4 credit hours

THEOLOGY IV

T-607 This course examines the doctrine of salvation. 4 credit hours

THEOLOGY III

T-606 This course examines the doctrine of the Holy Spirit. 4 credit hours

THEOLOGY II

T-605 This course examines the doctrine of Jesus Christ. 4 credit hours

THEOLOGY I

T-604 This course examines the doctrine of the scriptures. 4 credit hours

A LIFE OF CHRIST I & II

T-423/424 The candidate studies the life and times of Christ in relation to various subjects presented by Christ and the cultural and social customs of Christ's day. 4 credit hours

WHAT CHRISTIANS BELIEVE I & II

T-551, 552, 651, 652 The story of the beginning of Christianity from a Biblical perspective focusing on the doctrine of the Christian Church. 4 credit hours

THEOLOGY AND THE CHURCH I & II

T-553, 554, 653, 654 Here is a study of church history and its ministry in the modern world, based on various evaluation of contemporary feminist perspective. 4 credit hours

HERMENEUTIC

T-420, 620 A study of the interpretation of scripture. 4 credit hours

CHRISTOLOGY

T-421 The study of the life and ministry of Jesus. 4 credit hours

Theology I-II

T-404-405 This approach to Theology seeks to simplify doctrinal concepts and present them in a readily under stable form as they set forth in the scriptures. The student will study the meaning and purpose of Theology. 4 credit hours
